He decided to speak with the farmer.




Assembly focus this week: David and Goliath David and Goliath

David was only a young boy, but he had trusted God to help him many times when he was looking after his father's sheep.



End of year events

Dear parents, thank you for your wonderful feedback, suggestions and thoughts throughout this year and with the surveys. This has been a VERY challenging year, and with the best intentions, things have unfortunately not always materialised as I had hoped for.



I am really blessed with a parent community that is so supportive. I would like to invite you to a meet-and-greet coffee/tea afternoon in the new academic year, in order for me to properly meet you, as hopefully restriction will be waived in September.

With only 13 school days to go, we are hopeful to end the year on a positive note, with pupils to finish the year with happy memories. I fully understand that these memories might not necessarily portray those of "normal" years, which really saddens me greatly.

You will be aware of the government's guidelines and policies due to the pandemic. These are cascaded to schools via the Department for Education and Essex County Council. We have also received a letter from the Director of Education (Clare Kershaw) regarding end of year events. (Please she attached).

Please be assured, that I liaise with our Chair of Governors, School Effectiveness Partner and Headteachers in our Epping Forest Schools Partnership to find the best outcomes for our pupils, which at this moment in time still has to focus on the Safety of our pupils and community first.

I have honestly toiled about possible **safety solutions**, in collaboration with my fellow Headteachers in Essex, and we concluded yesterday that the majority of schools will go ahead with in-house events, but that parents may not be invited in to the majority of these. The reasons being, that there has been an increase of COVID cases in Essex this last week, and one primary school in Ongar had to close half of their school due to an outbreak. Schools are really struggling, to make decisions to keep everyone happy. This is presenting to be very difficult. Our duty of care is to make sure we are keeping each other safe.

I know that I have suggested that we will be looking into inviting parents to our school sports event on Friday, 16th July. Sadly, this will not be manageable, as we are concerned that if there is any positive cases of COVID following the event, that the school might have to close on Monday, 19th July, meaning that our year 6 pupils will not be able to have their planned leavers celebrations, and all classes will miss out on the booked Pantomime and planned class picnics. We will however take pictures of the sport event for the newsletter, so that parents can celebrate with their children.

For the planned events, we will have a Risk Assessment in place and ask parents/carers to wear a face covering and use hand sanitiser on entering the school premises. However, we cannot enforce these control measures, even if gathering outside in bubbles of 30, or request all attendees to have proof of a negative COVID test.

I will really appreciate your support in this, as I know how frustrating it is, especially seeing how trial sporting events in arenas are contradicting what schools are being told to put in place. I can only apologies for this and am really saddened by this.

I will keep you updated, once the government has informed us on further decisions as we work towards the 19th July, with hopefully the easing of restrictions such as wearing face coverings and social distancing.

Arrangements for year 6 leavers (please liaise with Mrs Debrah-Nkansah)

- Year 6 pupils to have shirts and autograph books signed (week of 12 July). Social distancing to be adhered to.
- Mobile phones are not allowed in school on the last day due to e-safety and safeguarding protocol.

The following arrangements will go ahead:

Friday, 9 July	Pupils to meet their new class teachers.
Tuesday, 13 July	 AFTER SCHOOL - 15:45 - Reception class new intake (2021/22) picnic. One parent/carer per child invited. Will be outdoors and a maximum group of 30.
Friday, 16 July	 West Essex School Sports Partnership to deliver a sports event for pupils (no parents to attend). Reports out.
Monday, 19 July	 14:30 - Reception class picnic. One parent/carer per child. Will be outdoors and a maximum group of 30.
Tuesday, 20 July	 13:30 – Year 6 to have Collective Worship led by Rev. Brazier-Gibbs at St Nicholas Church, to celebrate their time at Dr Walker's. One parent/carer per child invited. Maximum group of 30. Will be following the Risk Assessment of St Nicholas Church. Whole school Pantomime in class bubbles – Robin Hood and his Socially Distanced Men.
Wednesday, 21 July	 Pupils come to school wearing school uniform. All classes to have a picnic outside on the playground (weather permitting) in their bubbles with their class teachers. 13:15 – Year 6 awards / leavers ceremony. One parent/carer per child. Will be outdoors and a maximum group of 30.

Dear Parents and Carers,

The delay to the national roadmap and easing of restrictions has been disappointing for many of us, but it is very important to continue to reduce non-essential mixing until the end of term, whilst the national effort focuses on vaccinating as many people as possible.

The main focus of schools and settings must be the education and wellbeing of their pupils and staff. Schools and settings have worked tirelessly since the beginning of the pandemic to ensure they remain a safe place and can continue to provide education for their pupils and students, whilst reducing the risk of contributing to rising case numbers in the community. There is guidance from the Department for Education, Public Health England and the Local Authority focused on this, which schools and settings must continue to adhere to.

For this reason, some schools and settings have cancelled or significantly amended the arrangements for events such as sports days, leavers assemblies and proms in line with their individual risk assessments and the protective measures they are able to keep in place. We fully support Headteachers to make these decisions in line with minimising mixing for the rest of term.

We ask that you please familiarise yourself with and adhere to school risk assessments and any event arrangements. If you have any questions or concerns, please speak to your child's school or setting in the first instance.
