

Attendance

We are <u>really concerned</u> about the attendance figures at school, especially compared with the previous three years for the same period: 01/09 -26/11.

Attendance is monitored.

Pupils <u>must</u> attend school every day, unless there are exceptional circumstances. Holidays during term time cannot be authorised and parents can incur a penalty charge issued. Parents cannot authorise absences.

For our pupils to gain the greatest benefit from their education, it is vital that they attend regularly and be at school, on time, every day the school is open unless the reason for the absence is unavoidable.

- The school day starts at 8.45 am when the gate opens.
- Registers are taken at 8.50 till 09:05 am.
- Children arriving after 09:05 am will be recorded as LATE.
- At 09:15 am the registers will be closed. In accordance with the Regulations, if your child arrives after that time they will receive a mark that shows them to be on site 'U', but this will not count as a present mark and it will mean they have an unauthorised absence.

There has also been an increase of requests of early collection of pupils at the end of the day. Please be aware the school day ends at <u>15:15</u> with collection then to follow.

We will much appreciate it if we can all work together to improve attendance, especially as we are working really hard with recovery due to the pandemic.







COVID

COVID numbers are on the increase in Essex. Please be courteous to our community by adhering to government guidelines.

If we are not vigilant, restrictions will have to be imposed again, e.g. bubbles and less initiatives resulting in cancellation of events, due to not having face-to-face contact.

As a school we are working really hard to follow guidelines and Risk Assess this constantly to ensure we can still go ahead with Christmas celebrations. We do need your help!

It is advised that pupils take Lateral Flow Tests twice a week. Please see letter from ECC below.













Dear Parent / Carer,

The approach to COVID-19 in school-aged children is to maximise children's access to education. As you are aware, children are very unlikely to become seriously ill with a COVID-19 infection, but they do need to self-isolate if they are infected. Whilst self-isolating, they miss out on the benefit of inschool education. It is therefore extremely important that we try to limit the spread of COVID-19 within a school setting to maximise school attendance at all times.

We have seen COVID-19 infections in primary school-aged children in Essex increasing over the past few weeks. At this rate, it is expected that some primary schools could see significant numbers of pupils infected with COVID-19. Throughout the pandemic, regular household testing has been encouraged, but we would now like to strengthen that advice for primary age children.

From this half term, to help limit the spread of the infection within primary schools we are asking you to:

- Support your primary school child, if you are not already doing so, to undertake twice-weekly lateral flow device tests.
- Be alert to COVID-19 symptoms in your child (high temperature, new continuous cough, or loss of sense of smell or taste).
- Encourage good hand hygiene within your household.

Whilst we understand this is different guidance for some of you, we would strongly encourage you to begin this practice as a family, excluding any child/ren under the age of 2. This will ensure that as much asymptomatic infection as possible is picked up and will help schools to continue to operate at full capacity and minimise the spread of infection through the school and wider community. You can collect test kits from your nearest pharmacy using one of the new collect codes which can be downloaded from https://test-for-coronavirus.service.gov.uk/collect-lateral-flow-kits. You can then hand this into your local pharmacy, who will provide you with test kits. You can also collect test kits from your local library or order them online via this link: https://test-igvuodo-not-have-symptoms/.

If a positive result is returned, your child/young person will need to seek a confirmatory PCR test and isolate for 10 days according to national guidance. If the PCR test is negative, your child can return to school if they are well enough to do so. We appreciate that the changes in guidance can cause anxiety for some, but it is important that the education of our children and young people is prioritised this academic year. The likelihood of serious illness in children is extremely low and after 18 months of serious disruption, the DFE and the Local Authority are committed to ensuring that all children and young people in Essex have every opportunity to catch up and exceed their potential.

Social Media abuse

Essex headteachers have been informed of an increase of online abuse targeted at schools and teaching staff.

Abusive comments have been shared on social media platforms inclusive of Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat and Twitter.

There has been coverage in the media of teachers and other school and college staff receiving abuse on social media platforms including **TikTok and Instagram**.



Authorities are aware of stories in the press about teachers and staff being the victims of abuse on TikTok and have worked with the platform to make it easier for videos to be removed.

It is never acceptable for anyone to harass or intimidate education staff. Some incidents may constitute a criminal offence and schools/colleges should report those they think may come into that category to the police.

What is online abuse?

There are different kinds of online abuse and people can be at risk of it from people they know or strangers. The government's <u>draft Online Safety Bill</u> defines online harms as user generated content or behaviour that is illegal or could cause significant physical or psychological harm to a person.

Examples of online harms include:

- child sexual exploitation and abuse
- terrorist use of the internet
- hate crime and hate speech
- harassment, cyberbullying and online abuse.

And online abuse isn't limited to social media – it can happen over text messages or messaging apps, over email, in online chats, online games and on streaming sites.

We're aware of stories in the press about teachers and staff being the victims of abuse on TikTok and have worked with the platform to make it easier for videos to be removed.

Education Secretary Nadhim Zahawi said:

The online abuse of teachers that has taken place recently is simply abhorrent. It can be incredibly damaging for a teacher's wellbeing and professional life and I am deeply concerned by the ongoing issue, which is why we have moved to make sure that TikTok do more on this trend.

It is never acceptable for teachers or anyone to be the subject of any kind of abuse.

All schools, colleges and other educational settings should report any online abuse, including videos, <u>to the police</u>.

Some incidents can result in a criminal offence being committed and it is important people are aware of the consequences of abuse and the impact it can have on an individual's mental health.

To arrange for tickets, please contact the school office.

All adults in attendance will be requested to wear a face covering, unless medically exempt and evidence is presented on the day of the performance, e.g. a medical letter or NHS exemption card.

In keeping with Safeguarding Policy, photos and recording will not be allowed during the performances. Class teachers will take photos to be shared with parents/carers.

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




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Christmas biscuits

With this in mind, we are asking children, parents, and families to support us with the **Christmas Pledge for 2021**.











Some interesting (and devastating) facts about Christmas cards and the impact schools have with the giving process

- Over 1 billion cards are given each year in the UK!
- It takes one tree to make approximately 3000 cards so each school would be responsible for potentially several trees being felled for the Christmas tradition.
- If a class of approximately 30 children give a card to all 30 others, then the total amount for EACH CLASS is approximately 900 cards!

Let's do the maths

- If a primary school has 1 class x 30 pupils per (7) years that will = over 6000 cards exchanged per Christmas and 2 trees are felled.
- If a primary school has 2 classes x 30 pupils per year that will = over 12,000 cards exchanged per Christmas and 4 trees felled.
- If a primary school has 3 classes x 30 pupils per year = over 18,000 cards exchanged per Christmas and 6 trees felled.

As an alternative way for children to share Christmas Wishes, an A1 template will be available within the children's classes for them to write Christmas messages to each other.

We hope that you will support us, and Essex Eco Council, in reducing our collective environmental impact.






School uniform
