



In Art and Design we have been finding out about the process of bronze casting. We looked at the method and discussed complications that might arise whilst using this method. We then explored some simple casting techniques. We read some casting instructions and decided to try and create our own cast using paper casting. Some of the challenging aspects we came across, using this method were – our layers were too thick and we did not push the paper towel into the surface texture deep enough.

Method



 Place your object into the bottom of the plastic container. Use a piece of sticky tack or clay to hold it in place.



Lay strips of damp tissue or paper towel over your object and gently press it down using your palm or a wet paintbrush.



Keep adding layers and pushing the tissue or paper towel into the surface texture.



When covered, leave to dry overnight in a warm place.




When dry, gently peel the paper cast from the object.



Look inside and outside the paper cast to see the object's surface detail.



Reception 2023 intake

As you may be aware, the primary school (Reception) admission round opened on Monday 7 November 2022, for parents of children to apply for a Reception school place for the academic year that starts in September 2023. The statutory national closing date for applications is 15 January 2023. From 7 November 2022, applications can be made via www.essex.gov.uk/admissions 99% of parents in Essex applied online last year. All of the application information is available on the website above.

Essex County Council, as the admission authority for Dr Walker's Primary School, is consulting on a reduction to the school's published admission number (PAN) for 2024-25. The proposal is to reduce the published admission number (PAN) from the current 23 to 15.

This is to enable the school to organise classes more effectively. There are sufficient school places available in the overall area to ensure a school place for every child. Dr Walker's Primary School is currently undersubscribed. No child for whom this school is the nearest school is expected to be denied a place in the normal admission round if this proposal proceeds.

School admission arrangements 2024-25

Parents and other interested persons are entitled to ask questions and comment on the above proposals.

The consultation period is open between Monday 28 November 2022 and Friday 13 January 2023.

The governing body of our school is made up of parent, staff, co-opted and Foundation governors.

A vacancy has arisen for a parent governor on our governing body. The governing body is asking you to nominate someone (maybe yourself!) with parental responsibility for a child at the school. If we receive more than one nomination, then a ballot will be held.

Before you decide to nominate someone, or indeed stand yourself, you may want to know a bit more about what is involved. Governors do not need to be experts in the field of education. What they do need is an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children and the time and willingness to get involved. The skills you have can be very useful to the governing body. Governors need what is known as 'soft skills' – the ability to be able to build relationships with a range of people, to be able to work as part of a team, to be able to question, and to make connections between different types of information. All governors are expected to be able to read straightforward budget reports and data on school standards.

Reception 2023 intake

As you may be aware, the primary school (Reception) admission round opened on Monday 7 November 2022, for parents of children to apply for a Reception school place for the academic year that starts in September 2023. The statutory national closing date for applications is 15 January 2023. From 7 November 2022, applications can be made via www.essex.gov.uk/admissions 99% of parents in Essex applied online last year. All of the application information is available on the website above.

Essex County Council, as the admission authority for Dr Walker's Primary School, is consulting on a reduction to the school's published admission number (PAN) for 2024-25. The proposal is to reduce the published admission number (PAN) from the current 23 to 15.

This is to enable the school to organise classes more effectively. There are sufficient school places available in the overall area to ensure a school place for every child. Dr Walker's Primary School is currently undersubscribed. No child for whom this school is the nearest school is expected to be denied a place in the normal admission round if this proposal proceeds.

Parents and other interested persons are entitled to ask questions and comment on the above proposals.

The consultation period is open between Monday 28 November 2022 and Friday 13 January 2023.

The governing body carries out its role by setting the vision for the school and then ensuring that the school works efficiently and effectively towards

achieving that vision. It does this by building a thorough knowledge of the school and its community, by both supporting and constructively challenging the school, and by ensuring accountability and compliance. The governing body of our school is made up of parent, staff, co-opted and Foundation governors.

A vacancy has arisen for a parent governor on our governing body. The governing body is asking you to nominate someone (maybe yourself!) with parental responsibility for a child at the school. If we receive more than one nomination, then a ballot will be held.

Before you decide to nominate someone, or indeed stand yourself, you may want to know a bit more about what is involved. Governors do not need to be experts in the field of education. What they do need is an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children and the time and willingness to get involved. The skills you have can be very useful to the governing body.
