





Jesus had twelve special friends who went everywhere with him and saw the miracles he did. They listened to his stories about God.




One day Jesus said to them,

to die on the Cross.


The soldiers came to get him.

What is the meaning of Easter?



Is it wrong to celebrate the Easter bunny coming to town with candy and Easter egg hunts? Not at all, but we must also remember this holiday's Biblical significance.

All too often we get caught up in the things of this world and lose sight of truth. That truth, during Easter, is Jesus' resurrection.

As we enter the Easter season, even if you choose to do an egg hunt or dye hard-boiled eggs, please don't forget to place Jesus at the heart of your celebrations. While the Easter bunny may come bearing chocolate bunnies, 2,000 years ago Jesus died bearing our sins to offer us eternal life.

HE IS RISEN

Celebrate the Resurrection

Easter from a Christian perspective:

- Easter is the holiest period of the Christian calendar.
- It is a time for Christian believers to reflect in the magnificent sacrifice the Lord Jesus Christ made on the Cross and to celebrate His Resurrection.
- Easter is always observed on a Sunday in the spring. It can fall on any Sunday between March 22 and April 25.
- Many Christians usually spend time at church in thought, prayer and celebration of Jesus Christ's life, and may get together with friends and family for a special meal.
- In many churches, Easter follows a season of prayer and fasting called Lent.
- Lent is observed in memory of the 40 days Jesus is said to have fasted, or gone without food, in the desert.
- Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. This day gets its name from the practice of putting ashes on the foreheads of the faithful as a symbol of the season.
- The week before Easter Sunday, is known as **Holy Week**. During this week, Christians remember the events they believe took place at the time of Jesus' death.
- Palm Sunday recalls the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem shortly before his death.
- Holy Thursday marks the Last Supper of Jesus with his disciples, or followers.
- Good Friday remembers the crucifixion, when Jesus was killed by being nailed to a cross.
- Christians believe that Jesus was resurrected on the third day after his death. **Easter is therefore** a celebration of new life.
- On Easter, Christians attend special church services.

Folk customs:

- The name Easter may come from Eostre, an Anglo-Saxon goddess. In ancient times, an annual spring festival was held in her honour.
- A number of popular folk customs are also associated with Easter. These have to do with rabbits and coloured eggs, which are ancient symbols of new life.



- For many the meaning of Easter have been commercialised with easter eggs, chocolate bunnies and hot cross buns.
- In some countries, children color eggs and then the eggs are hidden for them to find.
- According to tradition the Easter Bunny also leaves eggs and candy for children on Easter morning.

Some interesting facts:

Why do we eat Easter eggs?

- A lot of us may chomp on chocolate eggs at Easter, but originally eating eggs was not allowed by church leaders during the week leading up to Easter (known as Holy Week).
- So any eggs laid that week were saved and decorated to make them Holy Week eggs that were then given to children as gifts.
- Victorians adapted the tradition with satin-covered cardboard eggs filled with Easter gifts.
- This has now developed into the tradition that many people enjoy today.

Why are Easter eggs made of chocolate?

- The first chocolate eggs appeared in France and Germany in the 19th Century, but they were bitter and hard.
- As chocolate-making techniques improved, hollow eggs like the ones we have today were developed.
- They very quickly became popular and remain a favourite tradition with chocolate-lovers today.

What's the Easter Bunny then?

- The story of the Easter Bunny is thought to have become common in the 19th Century.
- Rabbits usually give birth to a big litter of babies (called kittens), so they became a symbol of new life.
- Legend has it that the Easter Bunny lays, decorates and hides eggs as they are also a symbol of new life.
- This is why some children might enjoy Easter egg hunts as part of the festival.
- It doesn't do all the work alone though!
- In Switzerland, Easter eggs are delivered by a cuckoo and in parts of Germany by a fox.


The history of Easter began in the 2nd century.



COVID update	From next week, parents and carers of all 5 to 11 year olds will be able to book a COVID-19 vaccination for their child. The national booking service will open for this age group on Saturday 2 April 2022, with the first appointments available from Monday 4 April 2022 onwards. Appointments will be available in larger vaccination centres and some community pharmacies. Larger vaccination centres will also offer whole family appointments so that already eligible adults and older children who are not fully vaccinated can take advantage of the 'evergreen' offer and have a vaccination at the same time as their 5 to 11 year old. Appointments for 5 to 11 year olds who are not 'at risk' will also be available at some GP-run sites. If your GP is offering the vaccine, they will contact you. Please do not contact them. Vaccinations are already available for 'at risk' 5 to 11 year olds, and children in this age group who live with someone who has a weakened immune system. Until now vaccinations for this 'at risk' group of children have been available through GPs and special educational needs schools but parents and carers will be now able to book their vaccination through the national booking service when that opens for 5-11s.
