
What happened this week in school?



Our Prefects presented a Remembrance day assembly to the whole school.










Mrs Spanton helped with reading some memorable information shared by Mrs Wallis.

Mrs Wallis shared some family memories of World War 1 and World War 2. We showed the original documents to the pupils in assembly.

Frederick William Flowers - 19/02/1899-22/12/1987

Frederick William Flowers was born in the lean to cottage by the bridge in Queen Street.

He had 2 brothers George and Charlie and a sister Florrie. They all lived their lives in Cannons Lane and worked locally.

He was a neighbor and family friend of Mrs Wallis's family when she was a girl. Freddie was a lovely man and told many stories to Mrs Wallis and her brothers, when they were growing up.

He was a baker at the village bakery at Yew Tree House opposite Fyfield Store. He worked at Witney Green Farm.

He went to active service at the end of the Great War-World War 1 and showed them the letters he wrote home to his mother.


In the Second World War he told many stories of the American Airmen who were based at the Willingale/ Fyfield Aerodrome at the top of Cannons Lane. They gave sweets and chocolate to the local children.

When the American airmen went home at the end of the 2nd World War they left all their bicycles behind, all the Flowers brothers ended up with new bikes to get them to work each day.

The gas mask belonged to Freddie Flowers, everyone was issued with a gas mask even babies.

The photograph is Freddie & Violet Flowers in 1985.






Enlistment papers from the 1st World War, belonging to Mrs Wallis' Great Grandfather, Leonard John Hardy (dated 12th July 1915).
