The volunteer, Charlotte, taught them how to behave around the dogs and what to look out for in order to be safe.



We came up with questions such as:


Do they celebrate Christmas?

Minutes from Helpers/Volunteers meeting (12.10.23)

Many thanks for the lovely comments, suggestions and ideas put forward by those in attendance (and on behalf of those who could not attend).

The following were discussed and agreed:

Strategic calendar

- The Headteacher shared the school's annual strategic calendar with possible suggested events and fundraising events.
- It was agreed to look at these termly and not plan for the whole year ahead.
- This term the focus is on Christmas.
 - There will not be a Christmas bazaar this year. Instead the school will host a Christmas Carol Concert (more information to follow as we will link the concert to "Christmas Around the World" and also have traditional Carols alongside a contemporary performance) and then a Christmas Disco for pupils.
 - The music tutor to help with preparing something using xylophones and ukuleles.
 - If there are any parents/governors who would like to be part of the performance e.g. singing or playing an instrument, please let the office know.
 - For the Disco, pupils will come to school in non-uniform.
 - Pupils will still have Christmas activities in school such as Christmas Jumper Day, Christmas Dinner, etc.
 - Reception pupils will also still dress up as the nativity characters to celebrate Christmas.
 - As a Church of England school we do celebrate the Christian foundation of Christmas as this the heart of the school's vision.
 - We will also have a Christmas service at St Nicholas' Church for pupils, parents and staff.
 - The school to look at the possibility of visiting a care home to go and sing carols Student Council to arrange this.

Fundraising events

- The Headtacher asked if helpers can consider fundraising for specific thing in the school.
- A suggestion was made to apply to Tesco for specific projects.
- We agreed to have a "HUGE COKE BOTTLE" in school and see how quick we can fill this up with small change donation (or more generous notes!). Might do one per class!
- Parents conveyed they would like to see pupil voice and democracy to be an element of fundraising events.
- It was agreed to have a small comments/suggestion box in the reception where parents can drop anonymous suggestions (these need to be realistic) – the box will not be there to post complaints in.
- Suggestions:
 - Pupils to be "Headteacher of the Day"
 - Sponsored walk
 - Sponsored silence
 - Sponsored skipping
 - Penalty shootout (on a PE day)
 - Parent vs teaching staff sports activity/competition (on sports day).

Educational visits

- The Headteacher explained the importance of these events, but that they are costly. We hosted brilliant activities in the past e.g. the hatching ducklings, circus workshop, planetarium dome, visiting zoo, Shakespeare workshop, etc. and would like to do so going forward.
- Events are either to be hosted at school, e.g. the year 6 Tudor workshop or to be off site, which might require booking coaches which will push up cost in excess of £25 per pupil.
- Where possible we will look at trips where parents can help with the transportation to reduce costs.
- It was also suggested for families to make a termly voluntary payment of around £25 per child to be used for educational visits and then no further contributions will be asked for. If the school did not receive the voluntary contributions, these events would not be possible to be offered.

Volunteer Readers:

• Discussion ensued around the possibility of parents coming in with their children before school to read. We will look at the possibility of Reading mornings and for parents to "Bring a breakfast and Story book" to school for these mornings. We will look at either a whole school or class set-up (TBC). Parents to be with their own child(ren) for supervision and not other children. The



- purpose is to entrench a love of reading and support reading mileage. The morning to finish with an online virtual story.
- The school is also looking at the progression of reading in school and volunteer readers to come in to school regularly. A reading agreement will have to be signed for volunteers to help in this regard. A DBS will also be required.

Clubs

- The headteacher encourage pupils to take up provision of the SCS sports company, iRock for a music band and Dance tuition. If there are too few numbers, external providers cannot deliver it.
- The headteacher explained the limitation of staffing numbers to run clubs after school.
- Other suggestions:
 - Seasonal Gardening
 - Homework club
 - Lego club
 - Colouring club

Public Relations (PR)

- This is much needed to increase the school's pupil numbers.
- Positive Word of Mouth is extremely important.
- Please encourage positive feedback and commend in the community and on social media.
- The school is open for any suggestions as to how we can promote the school.
